




Conducting Wildlife Surveys at MCCD

Program Services Update

What a summer it's been already! June was off to a very busy start as summer camps and summer library programs kicked off. For those that may not know, the District hosts five different summer camps:

- Earth Adventures: a full day, week-long, summer-long camp for children ages 6-12
- Adventure Club: a camp that meets on Tuesday mornings for children ages 5-12
- History Camp: a history-themed camp that meets on Wednesday mornings for children ages 6-12
- Mini Camp: for ages 1-5 with an adult buddy, this camp meets for one hour on either Tuesday or Thursday mornings
- Extreme Camp: a more adventurous, full-day camp for children ages 10-15

While we still have spots open in Mini Camp and the last week of Extreme Camp, all of our other camps are totally full – an exciting feat that tells us our camps are well-liked and offering something worthwhile in our community. We are so grateful to the families that trust us with their children over the summer!

Outside of camps, staff are also kept busy with visits to regional libraries to support their summer reading programs. In the first two weeks of June, staff visited 18 libraries – and that's in addition to other programs (nursing homes, summer schools) and staff projects. The rest of the summer proves to be just as busy and fulfilling.



Of course, we also have public programs and events to tend to! We hope to see you at one of our upcoming Summer Concerts, yoga programs, van trips, and/or special events like Astronomy Jamboree and the Hummingbird Festival. We hope your summer is as great as ours!

The More You Know

The Macon County Conservation District (MCCD) is fortunate to have a nonprofit partner that plays a key role in supporting its mission. The Macon County Conservation Foundation, originally established in 1981 under the name Natural Heritage and Wildlife Foundation, was created by MCCD employees Janet Atkins and Rodney Washburn as a way to accept donations of land and financial gifts on behalf of the District. In 2003, the organization adopted the name Macon County Conservation Foundation to more clearly reflect its purpose and connection to the local community.

Operations Update

Operations crews have been very busy with the growing season in full swing. Many District sites have an infestation of invasive and exotic plants, including crown vetch, sericea lespedeza, Canada thistle, teasel, and honeysuckle. The growing season allows for the use of herbicides to slow the growth and even kill these species. Staff have been spraying herbicide at several District locations, targeting these invasive plants. Another method to slow the spread of invasive plants is mowing before the invasive plant goes to seed. Several acres have been mowed to slow the growth of plant life and prevent the reproduction of invasive plants.



With changes to staff offices, the need for a new conference room has come. Operations staff have been working on framing and drywalling a new conference room on the lower level, which is located below the Window on Wildlife. The new conference room is a little bigger than the previous conference room and will make a nice addition to the office space. Operations staff have many talents, and it shows in projects like these.



Staff have been doing prep work for several special events. The public usually doesn't see the setup and take down for these events, but this is critical to the events functioning so well. A huge thank you to all the Operations staff for the hard work they do.
