RiverWatch Training Workshop



Operations Update



Snow plowing and salt spreading have kept Operations staff busy as we have had several snow events over the past few months. Operations staff do a great job keeping the sidewalks and entryways clear so visitors can reach the Nature Center safely.



With a few warmer days, windy weather conditions have made it possible to start prescribed burning. Operations crews have burned around 600 acres of District property to manage exotic and invasive species. Fire is one of the biggest tools in the tool bag that we use to fight many of the invasive plants on District acres. Along with controlling invasives, fire also stimulates the growth of some species of forbs. We are still early in the burning season and hope to get many more acres burned. Several acres of District land that the burn crew is concentrating on this year have not experienced fire while under our ownership. Staff have been spreading seeds that have been collected from District prairies to improve plant diversity in several of the burn locations.

Staff have also been busy working at Fort Daniel doing forestry mowing and hand cutting of invasive and non-native trees and shrubs. The Natural Resources crew has been helping Friends Creek staff remove a large grove of black locust trees north of the Friends Creek Shop. While at Friends Creek, the Natural Resources crew has also helped Friends Creek staff with a restoration project on the west boundary. The Natural Resources crew has also been cleaning up the Griswold Conservation Area trailer site and the east side of the kame. The area has been frost seeded, so the kame will have a fresh appearance by spring.



The More You Know

We often receive inquiries about the sources of our funding, and we're excited to share the story behind it! Our organization thrives thanks to a diverse array of funding avenues. A significant portion of our revenue—it amounts to about 80% comes from property taxes in Macon County. This crucial support plays a vital role in allowing us to fulfill our mission.

Beyond property taxes, we also generate income through program fees, rental fees, various grants, and other contributions. This includes heartfelt memorials, generous donations, and vibrant fundraising efforts via the Macon County Conservation Foundation. We even benefit from rental income from farmland that's still in production, alongside support from the Nearing Trust.

For our larger projects—think exciting bike trail enhancements or expanding our land—we actively seek grants from notable sources like the Open Space Land Acquisition & Development (OSLAD) program through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Our programming wouldn't be the same without our partnership with the Decatur Area Audubon Society. They're instrumental in supporting us with transportation grants for schools visiting our programs and co-sponsoring fantastic events like the Festival of Spring. This year, we're thrilled to introduce a summer Audubon Internship position, made possible by their generous sponsorship.

Additionally, the Macon County Conservation Foundation, a proud 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, plays an essential role in our efforts. This year, they are hosting three exciting fundraising events: Rock Springs Ramble, Wine in the Wild, and Prairie Pedal.
