# Volunteer Program Update

Happy New Year! As we kick off 2026, I want to say a huge thank you for everything you accomplished in 2025. From January through November, **410 volunteers contributed over 9,275 hours!** Your dedication not only makes a real difference in our community but also helps us secure grants and funding to continue protecting Macon County's natural and cultural resources. Every hour you give creates a ripple effect that strengthens Macon County for years to come. If you've forgotten to submit any hours, it's not too late – they all count!

2025 was a busy and exciting year for me too! In October, I earned my **Certified in Volunteer Administration (CVA)** credential, joining an international network of volunteer professionals. This process allowed me to take a deeper look into volunteer management and identify ways our program can continue to grow and improve. In November, I attended a virtual Vision Planning class and created a **Strategic Volunteer Plan** for 2026.

Our volunteer program will focus on **three big goals** this year:

- **Strengthen volunteer roles** by gathering input from volunteers and staff to update and create clear position descriptions, so everyone understands the impact of their contributions.
- **Expand natural resources impact** with new conservation and stewardship opportunities, giving our volunteer team chances to lead projects and share their skills.
- **Enhance program systems** through new technology tools and on-demand virtual training, including training for volunteers on how to use any new systems. This goal is budget-dependent and may be implemented later in the year.

These goals reflect our **commitment to community**: At the Macon County Conservation District, volunteers play a vital role in bringing our mission to life by helping care for our natural areas, share our local history, inspire youth, and welcome visitors. Together, volunteers and staff work as a team to protect and celebrate Macon County's natural and cultural resources for everyone to enjoy.

Thank you for your hard work and dedication in 2025. I can't wait to see what we accomplish together in 2026!

### Volunteer Herbicide Training

Are you interested in helping restore natural areas? Join us for herbicide training to become certified to use herbicides as a volunteer on Conservation District lands. This annual certification, required by the Illinois Pesticide Act, focuses on the safe and effective use of herbicides to control invasive species like bush honeysuckle and autumn olive. After the indoor training, volunteers are welcome to stay and create their own herbicide applicator ("kill-stick") using materials provided by the Macon County Conservation District. ## Program Services Update

Program Services staff spent the month of November finishing out the fall field trip season and preparing for the future. We led programs for groups from Shiloh CUSD, Our Lady of Lourdes, and the Social Emotional Learning Academy, among others. Brent and Nick (our Historic Sites Manager and Historic Sites Intern, respectively) held our annual Candlelight Tour at Homestead Prairie Farm, with 68 people in attendance (the second highest attendance for this event in several years). Though November is usually a quieter month for programming, we still kept busy and delivered many engaging and educational programs for our community and beyond.

Looking past November, staff will spend a lot of their upcoming time preparing the budget for the next fiscal year, which begins April 1. Though that is still several months away, we have to do a lot of research and planning to prepare a responsible budget to carry us through the next year. We have also been busy cleaning, sorting, and organizing downstairs. Our large storage room in the basement, which we refer to as the CORE, has been collecting resources and supplies for 30 years and was overdue for a cleanout. We spent a couple of weeks removing things we no longer needed and are now in the process of sorting through boxes of program materials to see what needs replaced and refreshed. So while we may not have very many programs in the winter (although we DO still have some!), we will still be busy preparing for the next busy season, which will start in late March or early April.

Thank you for all that you've done for the District this past year. Whether you engaged with the public at a special event or at the front desk, monitored a trail, assisted with a summer camp, helped us remove honeysuckle, or one of the myriad other important roles our volunteers serve, we are grateful for you. Have a fantastic holiday season and come visit us at the Nature Center!

Just like you, the Trustees give their time because they care deeply about our community and natural spaces. They bring big-picture thinking, community voices, and a shared love of nature to every meeting.

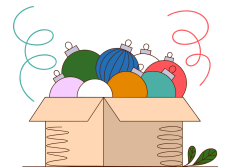

## Cross Country Ski Rental

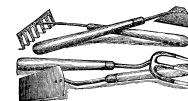
*Rock Springs Nature Center*

### Operations Update

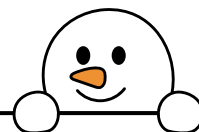

With the mild fall weather, Operations staff were able to complete several important projects. At Sand Creek, they treated bush honeysuckle, autumn olive, and other invasive plants with herbicide in late summer. This fall, staff widened the main trail by mowing back 50 to 70 feet in several areas, removing invasives and preparing the site for future prescribed burns to manage regrowth. At Rock Springs, forestry mowing created fire breaks on acres that have not burned in many years, helping reduce invasive plant spread and improve habitat management. These efforts support long-term ecosystem health and make future fire management more effective.

With winter approaching, staff completed the fall water shut-off process at all locations to prevent frozen pipes. They have also been taking care of fallen leaves and performing a final mowing of turf areas. Equipment has been transitioned from mowing to snow removal, and firewood has been cut and split for the wood-heated Friends Creeks shop. Winter equipment maintenance began once the first snow arrived, ensuring everything is ready for the season ahead.

The contractor has been making good progress at Fort Daniel. At the Pothole Prairie Restoration, several wetlands have been excavated and are being shaped, and the contractor has been awarded the prairie seed contract, with planting scheduled as soon as excavation is complete. At Fort Daniel's Woodbine Farm, a new parking lot has been paved, accommodating 20 cars and providing access to the upcoming trail system, and the lane to the farm was also paved to improve access and simplify maintenance. Staff are finalizing the restroom and pavilion contract, with construction expected to begin next spring near the new parking lot. These projects will enhance visitor access and support the long-term success of Fort Daniel's restoration and recreational efforts.

Nearing Lane has recently been resurfaced, replacing asphalt that was nearly 30 years old. This road serves thousands of visitors traveling to Rock Springs Nature Center, the trail system, and Homestead Prairie Farm. The new surface will improve safety and access and should serve our community well for many years to come.
